

Ladies and Gentlemen of Grand Prairie,

The year 2020 will not soon be forgotten as our city endured a number of hardships. We lost friends and family to a global pandemic including City Councilman Jim Swafford who, without question, made our city a better place to work and live. Yet in the midst of this turmoil, when many other police departments were simply trying to weather the storm, the Grand Prairie Police Department took a different approach. The men and women of your Grand Prairie Police Department led our country the way it should be led...by example. The officers brought those who chose to commit crime to justice while embracing our citizens in their time of need. During some of the greatest law enforcement challenges in our nation's history, the department led the effort to bring this city together in solidarity, all while having the fewest number of crimes in over a decade.


We leveraged technology, launched new programs to help those in mental health crisis, partnered with charities to provide food and clothing to those in need, and even used evidence-based strategies to target crime BEFORE it occurred. Consequently, crime was reduced by nearly 7% since 2019 and our overall crime was reduced by 48% since 2010. The city also had the fewest number of thefts, burglaries, and robberies since 2010, a feat we are proud of considering our population surge and the fact crime spiked in many of the cities around us. Finally, Grand Prairie was the only city in the Dallas region to have collision reductions in all categories including Driving While Intoxicated, Speed, Intersections, and injuries from failing to wear a safety belt. In short, Grand Prairie is among the safest places to work, live, and play!


Please know we will continue to provide the highest level of service to all those we serve whether you are our guest or live in our GRAND city because, after all, we work for you!







Sergeant Gregory L. Hunter

END OF WATCH: JUNE 18, 2004

Sergeant Gregory L. Hunter began his law enforcement career with the Grand Prairie Police Department on January 4, 1973. He was the city's first African-American Officer to be commissioned by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. On Friday, June 18, 2004, Sergeant Hunter was mortally wounded while he and Officer Bruce Seix investigated a suspicious vehicle at Walmart. Sergeant Hunter was ambushed by the suspect who opened fire as he emerged from behind a curtain inside his van. Sergeant Hunter is survived by his wife Denise and their daughter Erin.

Officer Lyndon F. King

END OF WATCH: MARCH 1, 1982

Officer Lyndon F. King began his career as a Reserve Officer in 1973. He became a full time officer on July 7, 1976. On March 1, 1982, he became the first Grand Prairie Police Officer to be killed in the line of duty. Officer King was investigating an accident on Interstate 30 near the N.W. 7th Street overpass. He was killed in an accident when a drunk driver struck his squad car from the rear, sending it into a spin, striking Officer King. Officer King is survived by his wife, Carolyn, and his son, Michael, who was 18 months old at the time of his line of duty death.

END OF WATCH: JUNE 7, 2019

On June 7, 2019, Police Officer AJ Castaneda was struck and killed by a vehicle while running radar on the President George Bush Turnpike, near Dickey Road. Officer Castaneda was a U.S. Coast Guard veteran. He had served with the Grand Prairie Police Department for five years and had previously served with the Tarrant County Sheriff's Office for six years. He is survived by one child.
