The year 2021 was a mix of emotions for us as we continued to battle an unseen enemy in COVID 19. In October, we lost Officer Andrew MacDonald to COVID-19, who is now forever enshrined in the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington D.C.

Despite the loss of Andy, our officers would not be deterred from keeping our city safe. According to FBI statistics, crime in Grand Prairie decreased by nearly 9% over 2020, which was previously marked as the safest year in over a decade. Grand Prairie was also named one of the safest cities in America, and the 2nd safest city in the Dallas/ Fort Worth area by the personal finance website WalletHub. 



2021 Population and Crime



Sergeant Gregory L. Hunter



Gregory L. Hunter OFFICER END OF WATCH: JUNE 18, 2004 Sergeant Gregory L. Hunter began his law enforcement career with the Grand Prairie Police Department on January 4, 1973. He was the city's first African-American Officer to be commissioned by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. On Friday, June 18, 2004, Sergeant Hunter was mortally wounded while he and Officer Bruce Seix investigated a suspicious vehicle at Walmart. Sergeant Hunter was ambushed by the suspect who opened fire as he emerged from behind a curtain inside his van. Sergeant Hunter is survived by his wife Denise and their daughter Erin.

Officer Lyndon F. King



Lyndon F. King OFFICER END OF WATCH: MARCH 1, 1982

Officer Lyndon F. King began his career as a Reserve Officer in 1973. He became a full time officer on July 7, 1976. On March 1, 1982, he became the first Grand Prairie Police Officer to be killed in the line of duty. Officer King was investigating an accident on Interstate 30 near the N.W. 7th Street overpass. He was killed in an accident when a drunk driver struck his squad car from the rear, sending it into a spin, striking Officer King. Officer King is survived by his wife, Carolyn, and his son, Michael, who was 18 months old at the time of his line of duty death.

Officer A.J. Castaneda



A.J. Castaneda OFFICER END OF WATCH: JUNE 7, 2019 On June 7, 2019, Police Officer AJ Castaneda was struck and killed by a vehicle while running radar on the President George Bush Turnpike, near Dickey Road. Officer Castaneda was a U.S. Coast Guard veteran. He had served with the Grand Prairie Police Department for five years and had previously served with the Tarrant County Sheriff's Office for six years. He is survived by one child.

Officer Andrew MacDonald

END OF WATCH: OCTOBER 18, 2021 and three brothers.

Police Officer Andy MacDonald died from complications as the result of contracting COVID-19 in the line of duty.

Officer MacDonald served with the Grand Prairie Police Department Police Department for 22 years. He is survived by his wife, father,
